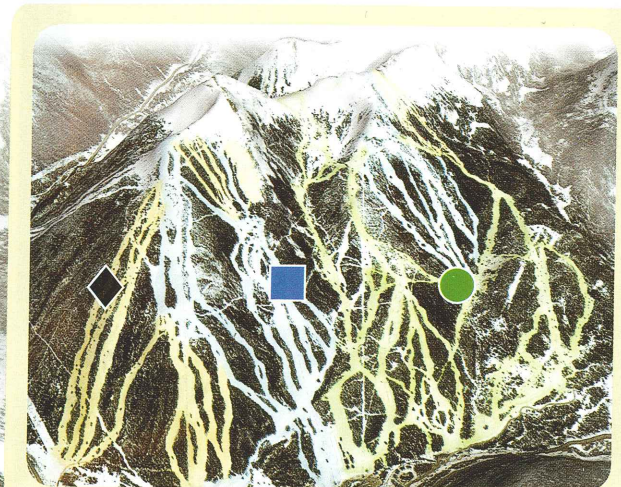
Your Responsibility Code:

1. Always stay in control, and avoid collisions with people or objects.
 2. People ahead of you have the right of way. Do not stop where you can obstruct the trail or create a hazard.
 3. You must not stop where you can obstruct the trail or create a hazard.
 4. Whenever starting downhill, yield to others.
 5. Always use devices to help you stop.
 6. Observe all posted signs and warnings, and stay out of closed areas.
 7. Prior to using any lift, you must load, ride and unload safely.
- Colorado law prohibits riding under the influence of alcohol or drugs.
 - Colorado law requires that you be sober to ski area employee before a collision resulting in injury.
 - Witnesses are encouraged to report unsafe behavior.
 - It is forbidden to ski or enter a ski area if you are intoxicated by a rope or is marked with a red flag.
 - Licenses are not required, but are revoked for the season.
 - Lands adjacent to Copper Mountain are managed by the United States Forest Service. Copper Mountain is one USFS

Backcountry Warning: The ski area boundary is not patrolled. Skiers or riders going beyond the boundary are not patrolled. Obstacles and other natural hazards in backcountry, if available, will be color-coded. Weather and avalanche conditions change rapidly. 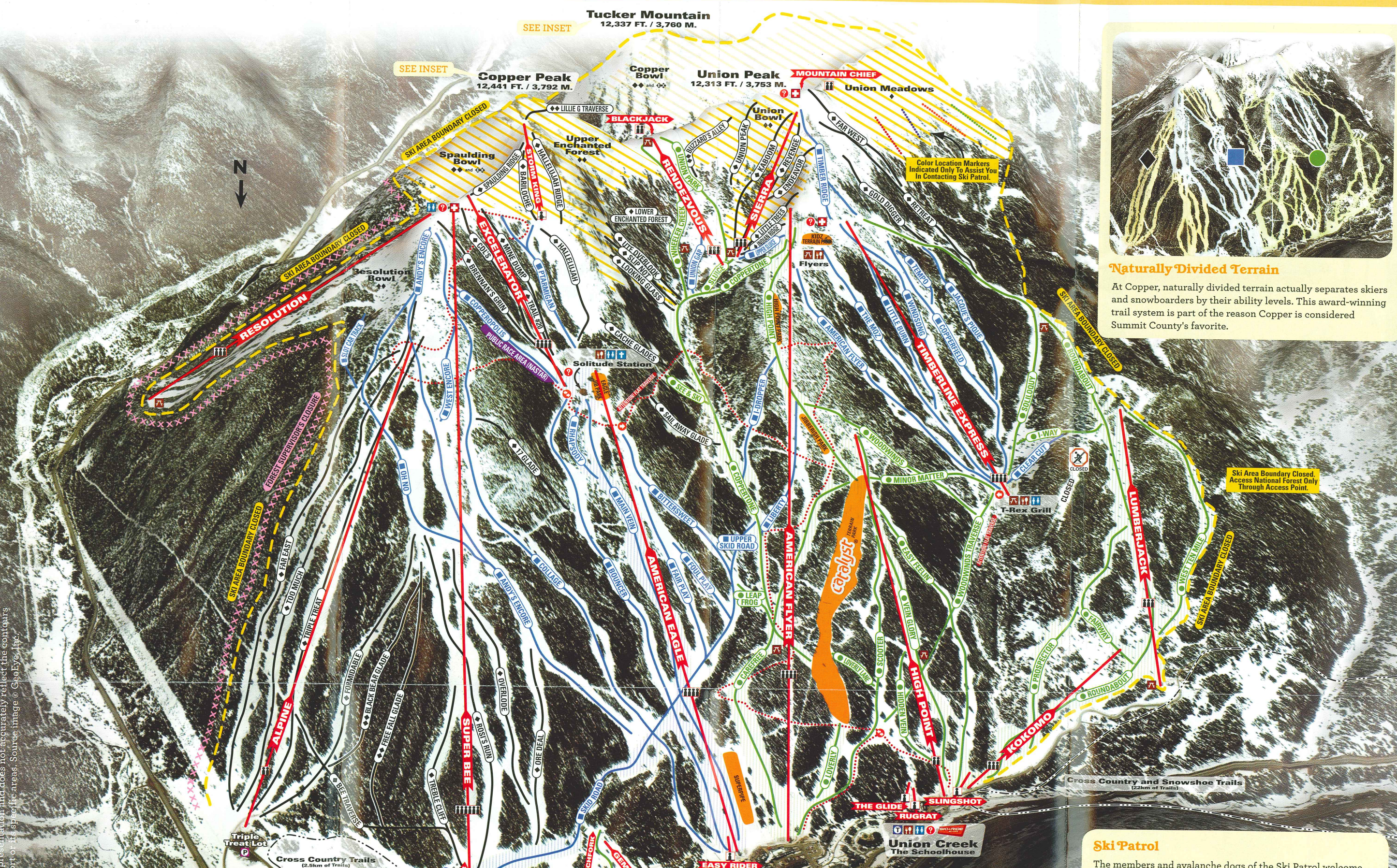
High Altitude Precautions
